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AUSTRIA



My internship in Vienna this summer was one of the nicest periods of my life. I am very grateful that I could go, an internship with IAESTE is a great opportunity.

I opted to take the night train to Vienna which is good for the climate but also allowed me to take a lot of luggage with me. This was the ideal beginning of my adventure. The ride was quite exhausting but rewarding. After two days of rest I was ready to start my internship!

I worked at the University of Natural Resources and Life Sciences or BOKU at the department of forestry. I enjoyed my first working experience and the regular days. I was never bored or lonely. My colleagues were all very nice to me. The Austrians were in my experience very relaxed and made me feel at ease.

It was great that I could be a part of almost every project at the department, which made my days very varied and made me meet a large



number of people. I helped where I could. My work consisted of scientific research and literature study. It was the best preparation for my thesis next year. During the internship we did go on a lot of trips, a nice opportunity for me to explore the rest of the country.

Every Wednesday we went to Lower Austria to retrieve some wood samples. It was a welcome variation from my regular office work. Afterwards I helped with drying and weighing the samples. The highlight of my internship was a trip to Abtenau where we tested a warning system for wood logging. The mountains were breathtaking. During the internship my German

and English improved naturally.

IAESTE helped me with finding a great accommodation, I was really lucky to have a wonderful roommate from the Philippines. Nevertheless it was a great experience to live more independently: During the internship I met people from all over the world, each with different worldviews. It is a way to expand your own views, and to see Belgium from a different perspective.

During the internship I could experience new tastes every day. With work we also sometimes went to restaurants.

BRAZIL



I started my master's degree and was considering doing a summer internship to develop my skills and figure out which career path would be best for me. I was looking for a research internship at a university because I had already planned to do a research internship at a private company during the second semester. When I heard about IAESTE, I was immediately eager to apply for internships in three of the various locations that IAESTE provides.

My first choice was Brazil because I had previously participated in an Erasmus exchange in Portugal, where I had gotten a taste of Portuguese-speaking culture. I also saw it as a great opportunity to practise and improve the fundamentals of Portuguese that I learned in Lisbon. I found a topic that matched my interests and studies, and I decided that I would fly to Brazil this summer!

I arrived in São Paulo at the end of July, I met Maria at the airport, and stayed in a "República" (student co-housing) for one night. The following morning, she drove me to the bus station, and I took the bus to São José do Rio Preto, the city where my campus was located. I was welcomed by my host, Geraldo, a very pleasant professor at the same university I was working at. The first day, he showed me the city around, helped me to buy a SIM card, showed me the way to the university, and introduced me to the university's administration. I had my own room with a bathroom, which was very convenient.

I was a little worried about making friends because I was the only IAESTE student residing in Rio Preto. These concerns were quickly dispelled, as the Brazilian students of the research group and the chemical department were extremely friendly. As the only international student on the campus, people

knew me as the "gringo" and invited me to the student parties from the very first week.



The research team I was a part of was excellent; I primarily collaborated on two projects with a PhD and post-doc. The working hours were flexible and varied depending on how far along the project was; they could be full days or just the morning or afternoon.

PORTUGAL



After the whole Covid thing and being about to finish my studies I decided to combine the pleasant with the practical and go on an international traineeship before starting a proper job. After some searching I found an interesting position as ML engineer in a small company in Porto that seemed quite interesting.



Leaving only one day after defending my thesis, I arrived in Porto a few hours later and quite quickly discovered that it has a vibrant Erasmus community by immediately getting invited to a small diner and a night out, something that set the tone for the rest of my time here. While there was always stuff spontaneously getting planned, the ESN is quite big and active there and

constantly organizes a plethora of events, ranging from weekend trips and parties to surfing lessons, all of which were great fun.

Starting work the next morning I was pleasantly surprised by both the job and the colleagues, three of whom were also IAESTE interns, making work feel more like an enjoyable project. Despite working full time, there was plenty of time in the evenings and weekends to enjoy Porto (both the city and the drink) and the rest of Portugal which was definitely necessary since it is such a beautiful country. Some excellent examples of this are the national parks with the Penada-Geres national park as a prime example.

After going climbing with some Germans I got invited to join a group of them (for some reason almost half of Porto is German) on a weekend trip there. It is not only a beautiful mountain range with splendid views everywhere but camping and cooking there with the group and having a generally splendid evening is to this day one of my better vacations .

While Geres and the other national parks (such as Serra Da Estrela and Berlengas) are great, the Portuguese cities are equally as picturesque. While they are nowhere near the size of some others, they make this up by their sheer amount of charm and being very habitable.



While I might not be completely impartial due to living there for six months, I think Porto is definitely the one I like most with a beautiful old city center around the Douro river and lots of historic buildings, parks everywhere to cool off or watch the sunset and a vibrant nightlife. Next to this it lies basically next to the coast, making frequent trips to the ocean possible and allowing one to enjoy the beach and even go surfing as much as one likes.

While I could keep going on about how everything was amazing I'll stop here by saying that I would recommend an IAESTE internship indiscriminately to everyone (one in Porto even more so) and that many of my fondest memories are the result of these past six months.



NORWAY



I spent almost 8 weeks in Oslo, Norway, and it was amazing. First I want to mention that everything was well organized by IAESTE and they were always there when I had any questions or I needed any help. At the beginning it was a lot of paperwork and it was really hard to find an accommodation nearby Oslo, but IAESTE Norway helped me out. They found a private room in a student dorm in a town next to Oslo.

I convinced my family to join me to Oslo a few days before the internship so we could have a small holiday and do some sightseeing. After these days the internship started. Together with some other international students: one from Spain, one from Poland, one from Malta and four Norwegian students we worked in a team on an inventive and exceptional project at the University of Oslo. The idea was to develop a pilot project that changes the way of teaching: no exams anymore, no

mandatory assignments anymore and no mandatory lectures anymore. Our supervisor was not that strict when and where we had to work, as long as the project was finished in time.



Because of a lot of free time, I had the chance to explore Norway very extensively. I did a lot of activities with IAESTE Norway, but also with the other interns and even with the colleagues from work. There are so many things to mention so I will only highlight a few. The first activity is the *Oslo weekend* organized by IAESTE. We were formed in two groups and got a booklet with small tasks we had to do. The tasks were related to

Norwegian traditions or we had to go to sights located around the city. Maybe you can recognize the well-known 'the scream' in the first picture ;)

Secondly, the *mountain trip* is highly recommended! Take your hiking shoes, rent a car and drive to the North for a hiking trip (But don't forget to pack warm clothes ;). Together with the international students, we rented a car for three days and went to Jotunheimen.

Jotunheimen is a mountainous area where the highest mountains of Norway are located. Next to the mountains we could admire the beautiful fjords.

Not everyone knows this, but in Norway everyone has the right to camp wherever they want, as long as it is not on private property. Moreover there is an organization called BUA, where you can rent a tent, sleeping bag, mattresses and even hiking shoes ... for free!

We took the opportunity to camp at one of the islands in the Oslofjord and have a small BBQ at the waterside and watch the sunset. It is very extraordinary, but to make the night even more perfect, we got the opportunity to see the Northern lights.

Briefly, I really want to encourage you to apply for an internship and take the chance to explore a



different country. Next to the working experience, you also get the chance to discover other cultures and make some new (international) friends. In my case I decided together with the other

interns to not go home directly, but we did a final city trip to Stockholm, Sweden to end our internship.



POLAND

AUSTRIA



From July until September I did an internship in Klosterneuburg, Austria. I really wanted to have an international experience after finishing my master's degree, but soon discovered this is not as easy as I first assumed. After graduation, a lot of programs such as Erasmus+ expect you to plan everything yourself, which is a lot of work combined with writing a thesis. IAESTE was awesome in this regard! I could do an internship, provided I was still enrolled (which I was until the end of September). For such a small fee they aided a lot: making bank appointments, informing me of everything that was necessary, giving a goodie bag, organising fun activities etc. I already felt really welcomed from the first day onwards.

While the internship at Höhere Bundeslehranstalt und Bundesamt für Wein- und Obstbau was more literature review than I expected due to some issues in the company, they provided a lot of

other benefits. They paid well (more than the cost of living so I could splurge a bit :D), gave me 5 days of paid leave and gave me flexible hours. The colleagues were friendly and even invited me to a birthday barbecue.

Due to my long internship (11 weeks) and close proximity to Vienna, I could really explore and delve deeper into the local Viennese and Austrian culture. I explored magnificent locations such as the Kunsthistorische and Naturhistorische museums, Karlskirche, Votivkirche, Belvedere and who can forget the never-ending fun fair, Prater. Vienna also holds

many green spaces such as Schönbrunn gardens and Donauinsel and is culturally bustling with many events such as concerts at Musikverein and a free (always good to hear as a student), 2 months long 'Filmfestival' at Rathausplatz with international cuisine. Speaking of, IAESTE organised an international food evening where everyone had to cook/bring something from their home country. Everyone tried local food from so many countries and thus learned about so many different cuisines at once. It was amazing!



People from IAESTE also gave an insiders tour of Vienna with fun quirky lesser known facts and less well known places. We ended that amazing tour by sipping a cool drink at Donaukanal like locals.

I not only visited Vienna but also travelled to Salzburg, Graz, Bratislava and München. All of this travelling was really affordable due to an ÖBB summer ticket and the Deutsches Bahn €9 ticket. In München I learned to love the Viennese public transport. Unlike



NORWAY



In short: The best adventure one could imagine! It was not only an internship in engineering, it was an adventure in which I pushed my boundaries and in which I made friends for life!

I've been in Norway before 8 years ago and have wanted to go back ever since because I fell in love with its magnificent nature. I convinced my parents to go on vacation in Denmark by car and take the ferry to Bergen. That way I could bring lots of Belgian beers to share with the lovely people I was about to meet because everything, especially alcohol, is ridiculously expensive in Norway (€10 for a beer in a bar). Luckily, the internship's salary was 'Norwegian' as well and covered all my expenses and travels (which can be cheap because nature is free).

While driving North a few days prior to the start of the internship I still did not have accommodation which IAESTE Norway should arrange. I was

preparing for the worst of having to cancel the internship and joining my parents back to Belgium, but luckily they found an affordable tiny apartment which I shared with 2 other amazing interns. I slept on a sleeping-sofa in the living room for 6 weeks, but I loved it!



We socialized with the other IAESTE interns at a local boat festival and did a trip on the fjords on an old expedition ship. It was the beginning of many weekend trips which we would plan a few days before after work. Johan from IAESTE Norway invited us to his family cabin close to Bergen in my first workweek. I had to ask for 2 days off work but my supervisor was super chill and insisted that I

enjoyed Norway! As Norwegians are extremely friendly, he even gave me some homemade cider to enjoy. I could drive Johans small boat in the fjords and learned how to fish :D! On some weekends after, we rented a cheap car via car sharing and did many crazy things which would take 10 pages to fully explain. Some highlights:

- Getting up at 4am to drive and hike (sprint) up Preikestolen in Stavanger to avoid the tourists. Enjoy breakfast at the verge of a cliff 400m deep into the fjord. (Figure 1)
- Camping in tents at a minifestival in Hallingskeid, which is nothing more than a train station and 4 huts in the cold and icy but beautiful mountains. The campfire, music, hikes, drinks and company kept us warm.

- Admiring the northern lights in Voss due to some lucky high solar activity while taking a sauna. Hiking up mount Oksen which gave us the view over the Hardangerfjord. (Figure 2)
- Watching the sunset next to a glacier at the Fonnabu-hut with some whiskey we found in our rental car

(lucky again) after hiking 1500m of height.

Everything passed so quickly and I would've loved to stay much longer in Norway. To anyone who is hesitating to apply: take a leap of faith! You will not regret it...





Between my first and second master I did a two month internship at Restoration Directorate, Malta. This was an incredible experience for many reasons. I think Malta is the perfect place to do an internship. It isn't a big island, so the large variety of beaches, pitoresk villages and beautiful landscapes is easy to explore. As from July to September the office is only open from 7h30-13h30, this gives you a perfect afternoon to explore the island. Be prepared for the hot weather. If you have explored the island Malta fully, a weekend to Gozo or Sicily is easy by ferry. I made some local friends and friends from all over Europe. My English improved a lot.

As a student engineering architecture it was very interesting to set my theoretical knowledge to practice in a total different context than I'm used to. The people at the office are very welcoming and in the kitchen you can always chat with everybody

while making a coffee. It is interesting to hear about all the different projects people in the office are busy with.



I was taken on site to document sites, do measurements and learn about the process of laser scanning. This showed me what needs to be done on site before starting with a project in the office. I found especially the scanning very interesting as this was my first encounter with it.

I got the chance to draw up parts of buildings and do deterioration mapping. I refined my drawing style and developed more eye for detail. Through the

various site visits, I came into frequent contact with limestone and gained knowledge about the various deterioration phenomena. I gradually learned to distinguish different phenomena from each other. As I before had very little knowledge about limestone, this was convenient for me to also be able to do deterioration mapping.

The main project I got the opportunity to take part in included the understanding of the whole site, historical research along with design. I learned about the importance of readability of a heritage site, the focal points for material use and how integrating the right function can revive a site.

Finally, I also visited sites where restoration works were already in full swing or completed. I think in this way I gained knowledge about the whole process of restoration, conservation and rehabilitation.

I wasn't sure what to expect before my internship, but it's an unforgettable experience.





There are no words to describe the amazing experience that I had in Iran. It is a wonderful country with plenty of culture, history and even nature. I was amazed to see how beautiful natural green landscapes the country possesses and such great architecture and very warm people. Tehran is a huge city with plenty of different zones, some parts look like the typical idea of the middle east and others are very technological new zones, but all mosques have mosaics and plenty of shiny mirrors that look awesome. Almost every week there was an event that was a little trip that could be even out of Tehran and during the summer a big one-week trip was arranged to see 3 cities in Iran. Anyway, there was always contact with everybody as most of the interns lived in the same dormitory, one building for boys and another for girls. The room and space in general were pretty good, I had a roommate that was another intern. Everyone on my floor was international and had a lot of interaction cooking or taking tea together. Almost every night we went out to have dinner or do some evening sightseeing together, we were around 19 interns (most of them from Europe) and all of us working in a different company or university.


